
Webinars

Guest Lectures

January 23: The Department of Pharmaceutics and Manipal-Government of Karnataka Bio-incubator, MAHE jointly organised a guest lecture on "Biological Drugs". Dr Sudhakar Bangera, Managing Partner, AILEEN Clinical Research Services, Hyderabad was the speaker. Dr Bangera's talk provided ideas, plans to work on biological drugs, and a deep understanding of regulatory requirements to launch a product.



The major aspects covered were – Regulations, Ideation, Guidance on Clinical Trials, and Guidance on Developing a Marketable Product.

February 13: Dr Christer Hogstrand, Professor, Diabetes and Nutritional Sciences Division, King's College London visited the institute and interacted with the Heads of various departments. He discussed the role of zinc and other trace metals in biology and disease. The team discussed the possibility of having collaborative research and a joint PhD in the areas of role of trace metals in biology.



February 22: The Department of Pharmaceutics hosted a guest lecture on "Recent Advances in Oral Solids Drug Delivery". The speaker for the session was Dr Venkatesh M, Director and Delivery Manager, IPDO, Dr Reddy's Laboratory, Hyderabad. Recent advances in the area of protein and peptide delivery via oral route were discussed. Dr Venkatesh emphasised on the application of continuous manufacturing in the development of solid oral dosage forms.



He cited many recent drug delivery technologies and products developed in this area for the delivery of various drugs and macromolecules.

February 28: Mr G Basavaraja, Regulatory Submissions Assembly-Senior, Global Regulatory Platforms and Delivery, R and D, GSK, Bengaluru gave an overview of the Regulatory Affairs,

briefing on the history of regulatory publishing. He deliberated on lifecycle management, Electronic submissions, Basics of eCTD Submission, NeeS. The speaker provided insights on eCTD validation and Tools used for Publishing and Validation. Finally, Mr Basavaraja, concluded the session by a demonstration of eCTD Xpress software followed by a Question-Answer session to widen the horizon of students' knowledge. Dr Sudheer Moorkoth, Head, Department of Pharmaceutical Quality Assurance, and Professor Dr Krishnamurthy Bhat felicitated the speaker.



March 7: Mr Kasi Valaparla, Associate Analyst, Novo Nordisk, Bengaluru was invited as a resource person to deliver a lecture by the Department of Pharmaceutical Quality Assurance. He spoke on the requirement of regulations in Pharma industries with special reference to its impact on the quality, safety, and efficacy of the product. Mr Valaparla provided valuable insights on dossiers, electronic and paper submissions. He elaborated on the validation and tools used for submission and of regulatory documents.



Seminars/ Workshops/ Conferences

Pre-Conference Workshop, CPCON 2020

January 10: The Department of Pharmacy Practice organised pre-conference workshops on three parallel themes - Medication Therapy Management (MTM), Applications of Clinical Pharmacokinetics inpatient care (PK), and scientific writing as part of 5th International Conference on Clinical Pharmacy (CPCON 2020).



Workshop on MTM was conducted by Professor Derek Charles Stewart, Qatar University Health and Dr Johnson George, Monash University, Australia. This workshop focused on medication review and the importance of MTM in improving the disease condition. The workshop on PK was mainly focused on pharmacokinetic data analysis. The session was handled by Dr Surulivel Rajan and Dr Vijayanarayana, Faculty of Department of Pharmacy Practice. The workshop on Scientific writing was conducted by Ms Bhavani and Ms Pranita, who are senior associate medical writers at Novartis. They focused on various types of publications and how a scientific writer plays an important role throughout the phases of Clinical Trial as well as the marketing of pharmaceuticals. Over 80 delegates from various pharmacy colleges at national and international levels attended the parallel sessions of the workshop.

January 11: International Conference on Clinical Pharmacy (CPCON) reached another milestone

The theme of the conference was "Innovative Approaches in Delivering Pharmaceutical Care". Dr Mahadev Rao, Professor and Head, Department of Pharmacy Practice, welcomed the gathering and introduced the speakers. The conference commenced with a keynote speech by Professor Derek Charles Stewart, Qatar University Health. Dr Stewart spoke about "Managing inappropriate polypharmacy in older people". Keynote speech was followed by the theme-based symposium on precision therapy. The resource persons for the symposium were Professor Jill Kolesar from the University of Kentucky, Scott Mosley from the University of Southern California (USC), and Dr Karthik Udupa, Professor and Head, Department of Medical Oncology, KMC Manipal. The symposium was followed by an open discussion on precision therapy. Mr Noam Morningstar-Kywi from the University of Southern California spoke on the dual degree program at USC. Post-lunch session began with a talk by Dr Saurabh Singh, Senior Grouphead-regulatory writing and submissions, Novartis. He spoke on "overview of regulatory writing: how a regulatory writer contributes to an NDA/BLA submission".



Dr Ashoojit Kaur, PCMH-restore health gave a speech on "A home-based primary care model based on physician-clinical pharmacist partnership". Dr Johnson George from Monash University, Australia also delivered a lecture. The scientific sessions of the first day concluded with oral and e-poster presentations. The day ended with cultural events and gala dinner.

Day two started with e-poster presentations, followed by a talk on "Using health outcomes research to direct drug utilisation review activities for the Mississippi Medicaid Program" by Dr Benjamin Franklin Banahan, Professor Emeritus, University of Mississippi, USA. Dr AV Jayapala Reddy, Associate Vice President-Global Head, Hetero Biopharma delivered a talk on "Pharmacoeconomics of biosimilar: an emerging markets perspective". The session ended with a scientific talk by Dr Ahsan Farooq, Zonal Medical Officer, Lifescan on "Medical affairs: an unchartered territory for clinical pharmacist", followed by discussion. Over 500 delegates attended the conference from 44 different colleges, both national as well as international. Out of 189 abstracts presented in the conference, best abstract, best poster, and oral presentation awards were given to the delegates during the valedictory program.

January 16-17: A two-day seminar on "Spectral Interpretation of New Chemical Entities" was organised by the Department of Pharmaceutical Chemistry Sponsored by Lupin and Labindia Analytical Instruments Pvt Ltd. Dr Vedavathi Puranik delivered an inspiring talk on the topic "Beautiful World of New Chemical Entities in Medicine and Industry". She spoke about various applications of X-Ray Crystallography and its principles.



Dr Puranik also enumerated various aspects required for the publication of data pertaining to the X-Ray Crystallography field. Mr Sandeep S Jagtap, Product Manager at Labindia Analytical Instruments Pvt Ltd, delivered a talk on the topic "Spectroscopy doesn't have option". He explained about NMR, 2D-NMR and IR principles and emphasised upon their respective instrumentation very particularly.



Dr K K Srinivasan presented a talk on the topic "Distinctive spectral features of newer drug molecules" on 17 January. He explained about IR, ¹H NMR and ¹³C NMR, and MS by showing several spectra of new drugs in the market.



He described each of the spectra and often asked questions about them and made the lecture very interactive, thus making the students learn to interpret the spectra. Dr Divyashree M S delivered a talk on the topic "Biological Macromolecules

separation and analysis". She discussed the principle and techniques of separating, specific do's and don'ts and distinguishing acceptable results of the analysis using Gel electrophoresis.



February 2: The ISPOR Manipal Student Chapter organised two workshops titled "Journey towards Entrepreneurship" and "Entrepreneurship Opportunity in Medical Field" during the annual fest- 'PharmaQuora'.



Dr Ramesh S Ve, Associate Professor and Head, Department of Optometry, Manipal Center for Health Professions emphasised innovation citing examples in medical devices and technology.



He stressed on taking up the entrepreneurial journey in Med Tech field. He explained the necessity to protect an idea and the need to patent it. Dr Ramesh elaborated on the medical device development cycle through his own entrepreneurial experience.

Dr Ishwar Haritas, Head and Coordinator at T A Pai Management Institute (TAPMI) centre for Entrepreneurship, explained about opportunities for a startup in the medical field. He motivated students to take up challenges in entrepreneurship. He detailed strategic planning in entrepreneurship and emphasised on the identification of unique ideas to pursue the same.

February 13: The Department of Pharmacology conducted a mini-workshop titled "Pharmacodynamics—Made Easy" A Workshop for Pharmacology beginners.



Dr Devinder Arora, Griffith University, Queensland, Australia, was the resource person. Over 35 delegates attended the session.



Dr Arora explained how these drugreceptor interactions are correlated with the pharmacodynamic parameters. This was followed by hands-on training to plot different dose-response curves (DRC) on both normal as well as semi-log graphs. He concluded by explaining the mechanism of actions of *V cholerae* and *B pertussis* in Cholera and Whooping cough, along with the relationship between blood pressure and RAAS via different case studies.

March 9 – 21: Short-term course of AICTE sponsored Quality Improvement Program (QIP) on "Biotherapeutics" organised by Departments of Pharmaceutics, Pharmacy Management and Pharmaceutical Biotechnology was inaugurated on 09 March 2020 by the Chief Guest, Dr PLNG Rao, Pro Vice Chancellor, MAHE, Manipal.
